Sir,

As a Republican front runner in my race for Georgia's 11th District, United States Congressional seat, (House of Representatives) I will be focusing my energies on solving global issues in addition to domestic ones. As such, I would like to visit North Korea and have meetings with your Supreme Leader, Kim Jong-un.

I have watched the news of Dennis Rodman who visited Kim Jong-un, but was discounted by the U.S. media. If invited, I'll fly to China and then to Pyongyang for discussions.

The purpose will be to gracefully help the DPRK –

- Officially end the war that has existed for sixty years, by all parties signing a peace treaty.
- Reintegrate the DPRK with South Korea, and bring prosperity to the north. East Germany reunited with West Germany and is now economically the strongest European country. There isn't a reason for North Korea not to become a global economic player.
- Elimination of minefields and heavy weapons at the DMZ, initially by your army and later by the ROK and the U.S. forces.
- Provide a transition from a densely armed DPRK to a more moderate level, while provide financial assistance for your armed forces during the transition.
- Elimination of nuclear weapons from the region by you allowing U.N. arms inspectors' unrestricted access to your facilities for inventory purposes, and subsequent removal of these weapons by ship, with your pledge (and ongoing supervision) not to build new ones.
- An end to supporting groups that are considered terrorist organizations in the west.
- Closure of your political, and other harsh prison camps.
- Provide food for the DPRK population during this transition, supplied by the United States because of the unparalleled level of cooperation. Burma's generals released their tight control of Myanmar, and it is starting to thrive.

Although not elected to Congress yet, I believe that with enough favorable U.S. and western press, now is the time to take dramatic steps to end fifty years of threats and enmity. The American public is tired of wars, as evidenced by President Obama's reluctance to attack Syria. This will be Kim Jong-un's chance

to be declared a hero to his people by moving the DPRK towards a far better future than a constant state of war readiness, bleeding resources from your economy.

Why am I willing to do this before being elected in November 2014? Because I am sixty-four years old, and want to help as quickly as I can. If I were forty, I would have plenty of time. I don't.
